

The Rector's Corner

Stir up our wills, O Lord and make them 'denchy'

Here we are at 'The Sunday Next Before Advent' – the last Sunday of the Church Year. 'Advent' comes from the Latin word 'adventus' which means 'to arrive'. No doubt the English word 'adventure' has the same origin. The French verb 'venir – to come' must also be connected.

Anyway on this last Sunday, we hear St. John the Baptist recommend Jesus to his disciples. "Looking upon Jesus as He walked," John said to them "Behold the Lamb of God". 'Lamb of God' was not a random title. By using it John was connecting the Lord to the Jewish Passover lamb – the lamb whose blood was painted on the door posts of the Jew's houses on the night the angel of death 'passed over' Egypt. By this blood the Israelite's houses were marked distinct from the houses of the Egyptians.

Jesus our Lamb of God came to shed His precious Blood on the Cross to save us, not from Pharoah, but from Satan and the power of sin. The first time, Jesus came quietly and lowly, like a lamb. His birth of the Virgin Mary was without fanfare. He came as a sacrificial lamb – to lay down His life as our Sin-bearer. Just as the Passover lamb had to be without blemish, so Jesus was the perfect and sinless One (Exodus 12.5). As the Prophet Jeremiah said, "This is His name whereby He shall be called, 'THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS'". (Jeremiah 23. 6)

But the Advent Gospels do not stop with the first-coming of Christ. They quickly move to His promised return when He shall come "in a cloud with power and great glory" (St. Luke 21.27). Then, we will see Jesus not as a lamb, but as a lion; then we shall know Him not only as our Lord and Saviour, but as our Judge and King.

In anticipation of Christ's Second Coming, the Collect for today, starts with this plea: "Stir up, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people". Quicken us. Inspire us. Light a fire under us. Help us to move forward, out of this rut we are in. Because the prayer starts with the words "Stir up" people have come to associate this Sunday with the making of the year's Christmas puddings. The British

tradition of Christmas pudding was made popular by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert.

It has become a tradition in many places, including Newfoundland. In an article in last November's 'Anglican Life', the Newfoundland Church newspaper, Ashley Ruby gave this description: "My grandmother often mentions, when she goes to make the pudding for us, how her father made the pudding when she was small. 'He never had a recipe,' she says, 'Just made it off the top of his head. A little of this and a little of that.' Many recipes call for a spoonful of cinnamon and a handful of raisins, baked or boiled into a denchy and delicious little pud, that adds a special spicy warmth to the meal. (The Newfoundland word 'denchy' refers to something that is still moist and not over cooked). Many recipes, however, require the pudding be made well in advance and re-heated on the day of. (Barb Joudrey's Aunt also included currants, and grated raw potato and carrot.)

After 20 long months on the COVID-19 roller-coaster, we all have a need to be stirred up spiritually. In Ashley Ruby's words, "As the days blend into one another, Advent is a beautiful time to take the reins of the season and claim our time back by living liturgically and diligently marking the course time as it passes, with such little pleasures as mixing up the Christmas pudding on a special day."

"These practices offer us several opportunities. Firstly, we are invited to deepen our knowledge of Scripture. Secondly, as we connect to the Divine through the Scripture, we are connected to the daily lives of our ancestors by participating in traditional practices that occur outside of church. And thirdly, we are invited to connect more within our family units (chosen family counts, too!) in little activities such as these in a time when our smallest circles have become integral."

Thank you for your assistance in this important endeavour of praying for the Physical, Mental, and Spiritual Health of our brothers and sisters."

November 2021 Vestry Meeting Briefs

- The Finance Committee reported that revenue from January 1 to October 31, 2021 was \$182,098 with expenses totalling \$210,978. Vestry is thankful to all parishioners who have continued with their weekly donations.
- A donation was received from Central United in support of our breakfast program.
- The Diocese has funded the full cost and installation of a tankless hot water heater to provide adequate hot water for showers and laundry services.
- Volunteers have been doing some electrical work around the church replacing bulbs and ballasts. Smoke sensors also need to be replaced.
- Vestry was made aware that within a few years, there will 1121 new apartments in the downtown core which could provide an opportunity for us to reach out and increase our church membership.
- A finance Committee and a sub committee to review the Memorial Fund were struck to prepare financials for the new year.
- The next Vestry Meeting will be held on Monday December 13, 2021 at 7pm.
