The Rector's Corner

What Mother Never Told Me About the Prayer Book (No.9)

Last week we looked closely at the canticles used in Morning Prayer. Today, let's take a few minutes with the Apostles' Creed. Three creeds are found in the Book of Common Prayer: the Apostles' (p.10), the Nicene (p.71) and the Athanasian (p. 695).

The Apostles' Creed did not receive its name because it was composed by the Apostles, but because it contains the true faith taught by the Apostles. A summary of the Christian Faith, close in substance to the Apostles' Creed, was made by St. Irenaeus in 180 A.D.. Another resembling the substance and form of the Apostles' Creed, as we know it, has been found in the writings of Rufinus, a priest of Aquileia, A.D. 390. Once composed, the Apostles' Creed was used by the early English Church at the Office of Prime (approximately 6:00 am).

There are some customs surrounding the Apostles' Creed: we stand and face east and say the words together. Standing signifies our readiness to defend the Faith; and saying the words together demonstrates our unity as the Body of Christ. The practice of turning towards the east originated at Baptism. The candidate turned their face towards the west in renouncing the devil and all his works, and to the east in making their profession of the Faith. Evan Daniel in his classic book <u>The Prayer Book: Its History, Language and Contents</u> (London: 1901) said, "Wherever Christians assemble for worship they turn their gaze toward one point, even as they direct their faith to one Object, the Lord Jesus Christ, who is so closely associated with the east, both by His incarnate career and by the figurative language of Scripture, in which He is expressly spoken of as the 'Dayspring from on high', and the 'Sun of Righteousness'".

There is also the custom of bowing our heads at the Name of JESUS. This was set forth in the Canons of the Church of England, as follows: "When in time of Divine Service the Lord Jesus shall be mentioned, due and lowly reverence shall be done by all persons present...testifying by these outwards gestures their inward humility, Christian resolution, and due acknowledgement that the Lord Jesus Christ, the true and eternal Son of God, is the only Saviour of the world, in whom alone all the mercies, graces, and promises of God to mankind, for this life and the life to come, are fully and wholly comprised."

Three other points: in the Apostles' Creed we say the words, "He descended into hell". In the Catechism, this explanation is made: "Note that the words 'He descended into hell' are considered as words of the same meaning as 'He went into the place of departed spirits". In the Greek, this meaning of 'hell' comes from the word "'Hades', the unseen world of departed spirits, not 'Gehenna', the place of torments" (Evan Daniel).

We also say, "I believe...in the Resurrection of the Body". Although it has been translated as 'Body', both the Greek and the Latin say "Resurrection of the *flesh*". This distinction emphasizes the power of God to transform every aspect of both the spiritual and the physical.

Finally, we state our belief in "The holy Catholic Church". "Catholic" in this sense means "Universal". It points us beyond our denomination and location and culture and age to the Christian Church, which extends beyond our individual experiences.

All of this and more is found in the Apostles' Creed, through which "we bear witness with the Church to the salvation brought to us in the Word and Sacrament" (from Understanding the Prayer Book, Fredericton: 1989). Thanks be to God!
