"Yoked together with Christ"

We have come to the end of May. Farmers in the region were at various stages of ploughing their fields and planting their crops for another season. While modern equipment is now widely used, many farmers around the world still utilize horses, cows and oxen to do their important work.

In Jesus day, oxen were used to plough and prepare the fields. Every season, a farmer would need to train the young oxen for the work they were to do. The most effective method of training the young animals was using yoke. As the young and old oxen were brought side-by-side, a yoke was placed across their shoulders. The farmer began As the oxen moved ahead together, the experienced ox's steadiness brought the young one in line - the yoke would chafe when the youngster desired to move his own way. Gradually, through the growing pains, the youngster would catch on. The yoke chafed less as the youngster came in line.






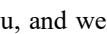


As we look back at that Gospel reading, Jesus is calling us into a unique relationship of being yoked with Him. We, like the young ox, are invited to not simply walk with Him but be yoked or "aligned" with Him. In our relationship with Him, we learn about Him because we are closely walking with Him. We learn from Him, because we now see and are doing the very things that He has done.

In an age where we are experiencing leadership "deficits," it is more important for us all to acknowledge the leadership and Headship of Christ in our lives. However, who is there better to learn from than the One who makes life possible? Who is there better to be attached to than the One who holds us and our future in the palm of His hand? He calls us into relationship and partnership with Him. Yoked with Christ, we are guided and anchored amid an increasingly uncertain age.

I urge you not simply to know who Jesus is, but to walk in step with Him so that you will learn and grow as strong as an ox for Him!

Five Mind Games the Enemy Uses When You're at Your Lowest

Sometimes nothing is wrong outwardly, yet inwardly your mind feels heavy, anxious, and unsettled. Fear, confusion, and pressure begin to grow even when circumstances seem normal. Scripture reminds us that the battle is not only around us, but also in our minds. The enemy works through lies, distortion, and discouragement, trying to shape how we think and what we believe.

1. The "What If" Trap

Fear often begins with "what if" thoughts:

- What if I fail?
- What if things fall apart?
- What if God does not come through?

These thoughts fuel anxiety by focusing on the worst possible outcome. Jesus taught us not to worry about tomorrow. Instead of living in "what if," anchor yourself in "even if." Even if things do not go as planned, God is still faithful.

2. Condemnation After Failure

After making mistakes, thoughts of shame often follow:

- God is tired of you.
- You are a hypocrite.
- There is no point in trying again.

Conviction leads you back to God, but condemnation pushes you away from Him. Scripture says there is no condemnation for those who are in Christ. The answer is not withdrawal, but repentance, grace, and moving forward again.

3. Comparison and Insecurity

Comparison quietly steals joy and confidence. Looking at others can make you feel behind, overlooked, or unqualified.

But calling is not a competition. God's plan for your life is unique to your journey. Celebrate others while remaining faithful in your own season. Gratitude helps refocus your heart on what God is doing in your life.

4. When Delay Feels Like Denial

Waiting seasons can make it seem like God is silent or unwilling to act. The enemy whispers that nothing will ever change.

But delay is not denial. God often works beneath the surface before anything becomes visible. Faith trusts God's character even when the timing is unclear.

5. Isolation and Mental Fog

Confusion and emotional heaviness often lead people into isolation. But isolation gives negative thoughts room to grow.

Healing begins by bringing struggles into the light:

- Be honest with God.
- Talk to a trusted believer or mentor.
- Stay connected instead of withdrawing.

Worship, rest, prayer, and healthy habits can help renew your mind and restore clarity.

How to Break the Cycle

Recognize unhealthy thoughts for what they are and replace them with God's truth. You cannot always stop thoughts from coming, but you can choose whether you agree with them.

Fill your mind with Scripture, worship, prayer, and truth. Resist the enemy firmly, knowing that through Christ you are not powerless in this battle.
